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Overview:

Students will brainstorm a list of careers/jobs that may be available at a papermill. From that list they will then take 1 of those jobs and do an in depth study of one of those potential jobs/careers.

Grade Level:

9-10

Learning objectives:

After doing this activity, students should be able to:

- work together as a team to brainstorm jobs/careers at a paper mill.
- research a particular job/career and provide the following information:
 - Schooling needed---(What type of schooling, cost of schooling, best places to go for schooling)
 - Pay scales—typical salary (research different parts of the country)
 - Job openings--(in different parts of the country)
 - Potential for job growth in job/career

Time: Four 30-minute classes

Two class periods for presentations

Materials:

- Papermill videos
- Whiteboard/projector or poster board and markers
- Computer
- Printer
- Jobs at a Papermill Grading Rubric (attached)

Directions:

1. Students will watch an introductory video to gain background knowledge of the processes and jobs found at a papermill. Example videos can be found here:

2. Students will work in groups of 3-4 and brainstorm all of the different types of job that they can think of at a papermill.
3. Teacher brings the class together and has the students share out what they came up with for jobs at a papermill. Write the jobs on the board or large sheet of paper. Have a brief discussion of what those jobs may look like.
4. INDIVIDUALLY the students will select one of those jobs and create a research project. The project must contain the required sections found in the rubric (attached).

Wrap-Up:

Students will share with the class what they learned in an oral presentation.

Extension Activity:

Students could start the activity with a live tour of a paper processing plant, such as Verso Corporation in Quinnesec, MI.

Representative(s) from a papermill could be invited to class to share their expertise about their jobs.

This project has the potential to lead to a job shadowing of the chosen job/career.
